

Why Make Your Own Dog Treats?

- You can choose healthier ingredients.
- You can tailor the treats to your pup's special tastes and dietary requirements.
- It can be safer- every year there are dog-related deaths due to safety issues with packaged treats.

About Your New Treat Making Silicone Mold

- Temperature safe from -40 to +446 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Oven, dishwasher, freezer, microwave safe

BAKED TREATS

Peanut Butter Pumpkin Dog Treats (Recipe courtesy of PRL Tech Librarian Lisa Zabka)

INGREDIENTS

- 1 can pumpkin puree (NOTE: do not use pumpkin pie filling)
- 2 eggs
- 3 tablespoons all natural peanut butter
- 1/2 cup oats
- 3 cups whole wheat flour, brown rice flour, or gluten free flour

DIRECTIONS

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees
- In a large bowl, whisk together the eggs, pumpkin and peanut butter until combined.
- Add oats and flour and stir well until dough forms.
- Silicone Mold: Roll a portion of dough into a ball, then press into silicone mold cavity to fill. Repeat until all of the mold cavities are filled.
- Baking Sheet: Pour dough onto a floured surface and roll out to 1/2 inch thick. Cut out using a cookie cutter. Transfer to a parchment lined baking sheet.
- Bake for 30 to 35 minutes until golden brown.

Chicken and Parsley Dog Treats (From www.theflyingcouponer.com)

INGREDIENTS

- 2 1/2 cups wheat flour
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 large egg
- 1/2 c. chicken broth
- 2 3 tablespoons chopped parsley

DIRECTIONS

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- In a mixing bowl, combine broth wheat flour, salt, egg, and parsley.
- Silicone Mold: Roll a portion of dough into into a ball, then press into silicone mold cavity to fill. Repeat until all of the mold cavities are filled.
- Baking sheet: Flour your kitchen counter and roll dough out to a ¼ of an inch. Dip a cookie cutter into flour and cut out the dog biscuits. Bake cookies on a cookie sheet lined with parchment paper.
- Bake for about 30-35 minutes

FROZEN TREATS

Yogurt Peanut Butter Banana Freezer Treats

INGREDIENTS

- 32 oz plain yogurt
- 3 tablespoons peanut butter (make sure it contains no xylitol, which is toxic to dogs) (or almond butter or cashew butter if allergic)
- 1 large banana, sliced

DIRECTIONS

- Put all ingredients into a food processor or blender. Blend until creamy.
- Fill a sillicon mold or ice cube tray with mixture
- Freeze for at least 2 hours.
- Pop out of molds and serve to your pup. Keep leftovers in an airtight container in the freezer.

Watermelon Sorbet

INGREDIENTS

- 3 cups of cubed, seedless watermelon
- 1/4 c. water

DIRECTIONS

- Lay watermelon in a single layer on a parchment-lined baking sheet and freeze overnight.
- In a food processor or blender, blend the watermelon with slowly pouring in water until it blends into a smooth mixture- you may need to add more or less water to get the right texture.
- Spoon into silicone molds or ice cube trays and freeze at least 2 hours.
